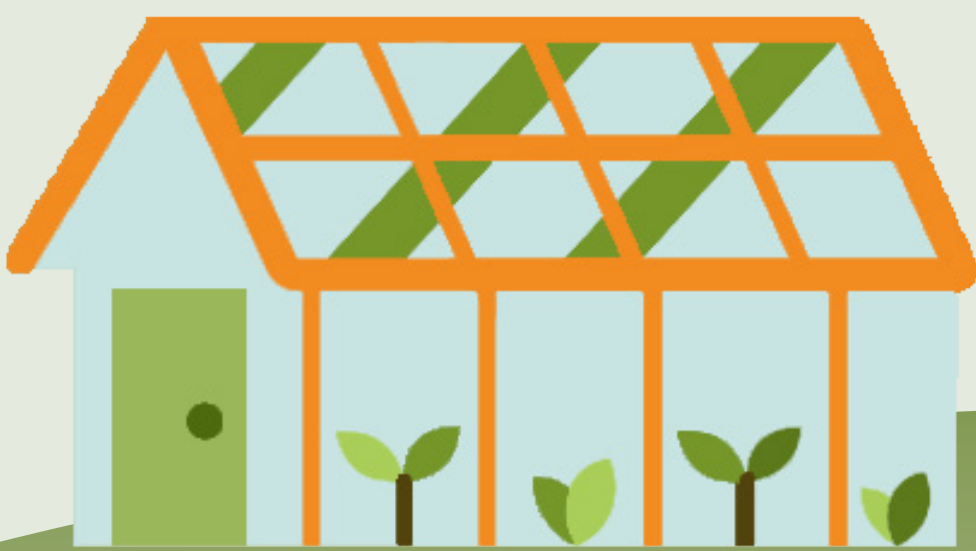

What Responsibilities Will You Have? ²

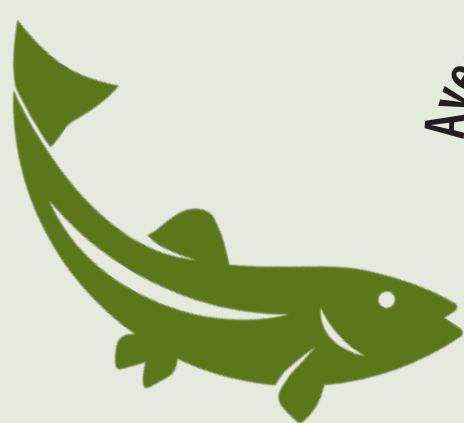
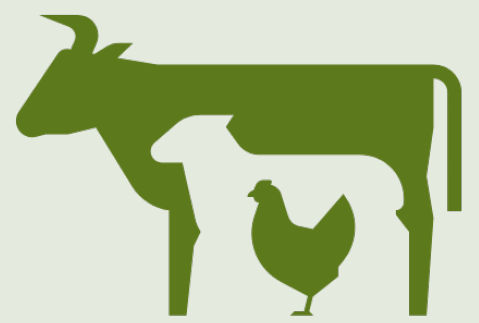
- Oversee inventory of plants.
- Plan species based on holidays, climate, and season.
- Supervise greenhouse workers.
- Manage plant health, handle diseases and pests.
- Harvest plants or their fruits.
- Recommend fertilizers and potting mediums.
- Manage greenhouse equipment and computer controls.
- Improve growth and harvest processes.
- Maintain breeding records.
- Forecast plant demand.
- Ensure environmental regulation compliance.

Farmers, Ranchers, and Agricultural Manager ³

These managers run establishments that produce crops, livestock, and dairy products. With this role comes the responsibilities for planning, coordinations, and overseeing the production processes, managing staff, and ensuring the farm or ranch operates efficiently.

Aquaculture Manager ⁴

Aquaculture managers oversee the breeding and raising of fish and shellfish in hatcheries for commercial or conservation purposes. They manage the day-to-day operations, supervise staff, ensure optimal water conditions, and handle any health issues affecting the aquatic stock.

Agriculture Inspector ⁵

Agriculture inspectors ensure that agricultural operations meet state and federal regulations. They inspect crops, livestock, and fish to verify their health and quality, and they ensure that production methods meet safety and sustainability standards.

General and Operations Manager ⁶

General and operations managers oversee the daily operations of an organization. They manage various departments, create policies, set goals, and ensure projects are completed on time. This role requires a broad skill set to handle different aspects of business management.

Required Skills and Education ^{2,3,5}

While you can find work as a Greenhouse Manager without formal education, many employers prefer candidates with at least a 2-year associate's degree in greenhouse management or bachelors degree in Horticulture. High school preparation should include courses such as agricultural education, botany, biology, horticulture, and mathematics. Farmers, ranchers, and other agricultural managers typically need at least a high school diploma and work experience in a related occupation.
